

# READING FOR UNDERSTANDING

Strategy 2. Predicting



Predicting means using clues in the text to foretell what will happen next.

#### Introduction



It's often very useful to stop when you're reading a story or an article, and figure out what you think is going to happen. Sometimes when you use that strategy, it makes you notice some details that you may have missed in what you have read so far. also helps you to be wide awake to details that are presented in the rest of the story.



Sometimes, you can get clues from an accompanying picture.

Sometimes, predicting is done with a whole class of students, rather than when you're on your own. Students in groups could use a think, pair, share format.



If you can find someone to pair with and share predictions while you work on this next story, that would be great.

Otherwise, you can still try the following strategy on your own.



As you read, you will be given the opportunity to discover whether your predictions come true.

Predicting can be done before reading and during reading.
